### **DATES TO REMEMBER**

August 1, traditionally known as Lammas Day, was an old festival to mark the mid-point between the summer solstice and autumn equinox.

August 10 is St. Lawrence's Day. "Fair weather on St. Lawrence's Day presages a fair autumn."


**August 11** marks the end of the Dog Days of Summer, which began on July 3.

August 17 is when the Cat Nights begin, harking back to a rather obscure Irish legend concerning witches: this bit of folklore also led to the idea that a cat has nine lives.

August 19 brings National Aviation Day, chosen for the birthday of Orville Wright, who piloted the first recorded flight of a powered heavier-than-air machine in 1903.

August 24 is St. Bartholomew Day. "At St. Bartholomew, there comes cold dew."

August 26 is Women's Equality Day, which celebrates the 1920 ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment and, with it, women's right to vote in the United States.



Like many of you, I am addicted to Tik Tok. How many of us got concerned when we heard it was going to be shut down? One of the downsides of technology is how we become immersed in apps that help us escape. I have noticed that often I will start to watch a few videos only to find I have wasted an hour watching Tik-Tok. What is the allure of apps like this? I believe it is more than mindless scrolling. In some way we are seeking connection with others and also, to understand how others are dealing with life as we are. It is fascinating to hear the way others are facing challenges and yet are finding strength in unique ways.

In a way, Tik-Tok teaches all of us a truth. Each of us is a story and how we learn to deal with life says much about who we are and how we grow and develop. In the Christian faith we have always respected this truth. It is called spiritual growth or sanctification. Both of these words are hard to define and seem a little outdated. So, let's try another expression - "growth in our Christian story". The theme of growth in the New Testament is a bit tricky. It isn't quite obvious, but it is a theme of our faith. Paul hints at it in I Corinthians 13:13.

"And now faith, hope, and love abide these three; and the greatest of these is love."

What he is saying is that sanctifying grace is synonymous with God's love. The more we practice God's love the more we grow in our Christian identity. Our personal story is a story of how we express, witness, and grow in love for ourselves and one another.

Sadly, many folks never find this truth. Many folks want to spew hatred, bigotry, ignorance, etc. And, this is their story. But is this our story. Let us be the ones called to love God and neighbor and may we see each new day as an opportunity to craft a beautiful story of growth in God's love.

No quilting knowledge is needed, but sewing skills are helpful.



### **AUGUST'S FUN FACTS**





August is the time to reap what you've sown, quite literally even, as most summer vegetables are ready to be harvested. It goes without saying, that August then is a time to celebrate a good harvest and a good summer!

In 8 BC the month was named Augustus, in honor of the Roman emperor Augustus.

In the northern hemisphere, August is considered to be the last month of summer. Back in the days of the Anglo-Saxons, the month was called Weod Monath. Its translation of "weed month" is quite literal – in this month weeds and other plants grow the fastest in the northern hemisphere.

On August 1<sup>st</sup>, Lammas day is celebrated as the first day of harvest. Traditionally it was the day in which harvested wheat would be baked into bread and given to the church. The bread was used as the Communion bread for a special mass to celebrate the beginning of the harvest. This tradition ended when Henry VIII broke away from the Catholic Church.

On August 6, 1762, the first-ever sandwich was created, at least with such a name. It was named after the Earl of Sandwich when he requested a dish involving meat between two pieces of bread. As the story goes, he requested it as he was in the middle of a gambling game and didn't want to interrupt it.

Those born in August are brought into this world under one of two star signs. If you were born before August 22<sup>nd</sup>, you're considered to be a Leo. If you're born on the 23<sup>rd</sup> or later, you're a Virgo. Leos are said to be very proud people who display great leadership. Virgos, on the other hand, are analytical and hardworking people, while still being kind and loyal.

August was a big month for the U.S. Civil Rights Movement. It was on August 28, 1963, that Martin Luther King Jr. gave his famous "I have a dream" speech to 250,000 people on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. Considered to be one of the most iconic speeches in the history of the US, King's speech called for the end of racial discrimination and for equal rights to all.

August also has two birth flowers – the vibrant multicolored gladiolus and the deep crimson poppy. The gladiolus flower is said to represent generosity, strength of character, and deep sincerity. The poppy flower couldn't be more different though, as it is a sign of imagination, eternal sleep, and oblivion!

August has three birthstones: sardonyx, spinel, and peridot. It is claimed that peridots have healing powers and can protect the bearer from evil.

August was a fateful month for the ancient Roman city of Pompeii. On August 24, 79AD, Mount Vesuvius erupted near the city. The mountain spewed out great clouds of ash, smoke, and pumice, which rained down on Pompeii's citizens

- . Improve outcomes for disadvantaged groups.
- Recognize and address historical injustices.
- Support mental health of high-risk groups.
- Uphold constitutional rights and promote good governance.

### **International Policy**

- Restore and support humanitarian aid.
- Defend human rights and religious freedom.
- Advance women and girls' rights and equality.
- Help prevent conflicts and build peace.
- Model moral consistency in foreign policy.

### **Environment & Energy Policy**

- Pursue pragmatic climate solutions.
- Support impacted communities.
- Promote community health.
- Prepare for and respond to natural disasters.


### **Prayer Ventures for August 2025**

- 1 We are church for the sake of the world, celebrating the abundant life that has been promised by God and fulfilled in Christ's life, death and resurrection. Pray for the Spirit to guide and inspire the discussions, decisions and work of the 2025 Churchwide Assembly, that our church will proclaim and exemplify the grace we have in Jesus.
- 2 Give thanks for those who participated in the Churchwide Assembly and ask God to protect them as they return to their faith communities.
- 3 Pray that when our interest is drawn to specific issues in our communities and the world, we will not lose sight of other issues that persist but have slipped away from public awareness.
- 4 Pray for worship leaders and musicians gathering for the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians conference in Raleigh-Durham, N.C., that their passion, creativity and skills for leading music will grow as a means of expressing faith and sharing the gospel.
- 5 Give thanks and praise to God for the joy, freedom and new life we have in Jesus Christ and for the promise of eternal life in the kingdom of God. Hallelujah!
- 6 Pray for lasting and resilient peace where there is conflict and war in the world, especially in Ukraine, Russia and the Middle East. Pray that we will not grow weary in supporting and caring for those who continue to live in uncertainty and suffering amid violence, injustice and displacement from their homes and communities.
- 7 Praise God that our new life in Christ empowers us to renew ourselves in the image of the Creator and to oppose and cleanse ourselves of anger, hate, slander, abusive language, racism, dishonesty, self-centeredness and greed.
- 8 Thank God for the ELCA's special relationship with the Moravian Church in America, a full communion partner since 1999. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor.
- 9 Pray for local, state and national leaders, that they will respect and respond to our neighbors on the fringes of society, including people who suffer poverty and hunger, who need shelter, who live with illnesses and conditions requiring constant care, and whose rights and protections have diminished. Pray for compassion, strength and persistent courage to advocate and care for our neighbors in need.
- 10 Pray for the Spirit's guidance and wisdom in understanding the parables Jesus shared over two thousand years ago, and for insight into the admonitions and wisdom they offer us today.
- 11 Pray for our missionaries and Young Adults in Global Mission who accompany global partners in 10 European countries, serving in ministries that provide education, pastoral leadership, social services and care for vulnerable populations.
- 12 International Youth Day Half the people on our planet are age 30 or younger. Pray for every nation to honor the gifts of young people, address the challenges they face and provide easy access to resources that contribute to their physical, spiritual, emotional, intellectual and economic well-being.

- 13 Ask God to bless those who have chosen to use their gifts, faith and time in long-term volunteer service with Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Urban Servant Corps, Holden Village or other domestic ministries.
- 14 Open our hearts and minds to see problems in the world as opportunities to encourage and care for one another, to seek new paths toward justice and peace, and to share the good news of God's mercy and love for humanity.
- 15 "Go my children, with my blessing, never alone. Waking, sleeping, I am with you, you are my own. In my love's baptismal river I have made you mine forever" (WOV 721). Praise God for being ever present in our lives and the world in times of turmoil, peace, fear, joy, failure and achievement.
- 16 Pray for students attending ELCA colleges, universities and seminaries, and other institutions of higher education, that they will grow in faith, knowledge, wisdom and commitment to serve others.
- 17 Ask the Spirit how we might align ourselves with the commandments, desires and priorities of God, the very things Jesus made clear to us through his life, suffering, death and resurrection.
- 18 Pray for the church leaders gathering for the Ecumenical School on Governance, Economics, and Management for an Economy of Life in Seoul, South Korea. Organized by the World Council of Churches, the Lutheran World Federation and other ecumenical organizations, the school helps leaders to bridge theology and economics and to advocate for a global economic system that meets the needs of humanity and responds to the crises we face today.
- 19 Give thanks to God that, through our collective generosity, our church provides grants and scholarships to support the ministries of individuals, communities, congregations, synods, and ELCA partners and companion churches.
- 20 "Am I a God near by, says the Lord, and not a God far off? Who can hide in secret places so that I cannot see them? says the Lord. Do I not fill heaven and earth? says the Lord" (Jeremiah 23:23-24). Give thanks that God sees all evil and deception in the world, and promise to be vigilant and discerning so that we might uplift our neighbors and please God.
- 21 Pray for the work of Sumud, an initiative of our church that works for justice in Palestine and Israel, proclaiming that all humans are beloved children of God who deserve safety, security and dignity.
- 22 Give thanks for the ELCA New Congregations ministry and for the 340 new-start congregations and ministries under development in the United States and the Caribbean, supported by local leaders and their synods' bishops and directors for evangelical mission.
- 23 Pray for congregational leaders and volunteers who are preparing fall programs and community ministries to share the gospel, nurture faith, serve neighbors in need and equip people of all ages and abilities to do God's work in the world.
- 24 There is no convenient or more suitable time to respond to the suffering of our neighbors. Pray that we will be mindful of those around us near and far and promptly respond with respect, kindness, generosity, sustainable solutions and concern for their short- and long-term needs.
- 25 Pray for teachers, student teachers, administrators and other school staff, that their strength, knowledge, creativity and commitment to students will be nourished throughout the school year. Ask the Spirit to help us express our thanks and support them in tangible ways.
- 26 "Glory to God, whose goodness shines on me, and to the Son, whose grace has pardoned me, and to the Spirit, whose love has set me free" (ACS 1087). Lift up praise and thanks to God!
- 27 Give thanks for people who play a significant role in your life, including those who inspire your faith, teach you life skills, influence your values, treat you with love and respect, and show up when you need someone to lean on.

- 28 Remember in prayer children, youth and adults whose lives have been touched and inspired by outdoor ministry experiences this summer. Pray that they will bring back to their home congregations their rekindled faith, enthusiasm, confidence and commitment to love their neighbors.
- 29 Rejoice in the daily care, support and sustenance we receive from God and our siblings in Christ. Pray that we, in turn, will freely share the same with our neighbors.
- 30 Each of us has a unique faith story to tell. Ask the Spirit to help us find our own way of describing our faith journey how God works through us and how Jesus Christ defines our lives.
- 31 Ask the Spirit for the faith needed to be both confident and humble. Promise to focus on neighbors in need and to resist personal desires for reward, status or advantage.
