#### **DATES TO REMEMBER**

May 1 is May Day. Mark the return of spring by bringing in branches of forsythia, lilacs, or other flowering shrubs from your region. May Day is also "Lei Day" in Hawaii. Leis are garlands or wreaths that are often made with native Hawaiian flowers such as plumeria. Nowadays, they are given as a symbol of greeting, farewell, affection, celebration, or honor, in the spirit of aloha.

May 4th Faith Lutheran is hosting the Hunger Initiative Community Meal from 4—6 PM in Parker Hall

May 5 is Cinco de Mayo ("The Fifth of May"). This day celebrates the victory of the Mexican army over the French army at The Battle of Puebla in 1862!

May 11 is Mother's Day—don't forget!

**May 17** is **Armed Forces Day**, which honors those who serve in all branches of the United States military.

**May 22** is <u>National Maritime Day</u>. Created in commemoration of the first transoceanic voyage via steamboat (completed by the U.S.S. *Savannah* in 1819), this holiday recognizes the efforts of the U.S. merchant marine during both war and peace.



"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19)

In May, the world outside reminds us of resurrection. Trees that were bare are blooming, people begin planting flowers and gardens, the daylight lasts longer, the ground is no longer frozen and the days are warmer. May is a time when God's creation itself seems to echo the promise of Easter: new life is here! There's a natural joy in this season, and it is a reminder that God is always in the business of renewal.

After Easter Sunday has come and gone, it's easy to wonder, "what now?" Easter Sunday often feels like a mountaintop moment. The church is filled with energy and flowers, and there's joy in the air. We proclaim, "Christ is risen!" with full hearts and voices. It's a day of celebration (and rightfully so)! But now that Easter is over and we're heading back to our ordinary rhythm, what does the resurrection look like in our everyday lives? Because Easter does not just end at the empty tomb. Jesus appears to his disciples, not just once, but again and again. He walks with them, eats with them, encourages them to carry the good news into the world. Easter is not the end of the story; it's the beginning of a new way of living. It is the beginning of a new hope that we have forever with Christ. It is a new promise for each one of you.

Because after the resurrection, Jesus did not simply make one grand appearance and disappear. He continued showing up: in gardens, on roads, behind locked doors. He met people in the middle of their confusion, in their grief and sorrow, and in their everyday lives, bringing peace, grace and love. And, that's still how Christ comes to us. He does not always show up in big, dramatic ways, but in the ordinary and the daily. In the quiet moments of forgiveness and love. In the gift of community. In the encouragement to keep going. In every act of love, no matter how small it may seem.

Easter continues even in those seemingly small moments, quiet faithfulness, and love shown. This season invites us to look for new life, not only in nature, but in our hearts, our relationships, and in our community. I see signs of resurrection life every day in this wonderful congregations I see it in the laughter of our youth as they serve as acolytes, as they served breakfast on Easter morning, and as they navigate their journey of faith and learn what it means to follow Jesus. I see it in their curiosity and questions. I see it in the volunteers who offer their time and energy week after week, whether it is for installing our new air conditioner, sewing quilts, preparing holiday food baskets, counting offering, assembling bulletins, serving food, fellowship, Sunday School, councils, and committees. I see it in your prayers, songs, and service. I see it in people comforting and showing up for one another. I see it in all the people who stick around before and after worship to visit with one another.

In other words: I see it in YOU. So, thank you. Thank you for being the church, not just on Sundays, but every day in between. Not just in a building, but everywhere. You are witnesses to new life, signs of God's love made visible.

Therefore, as we move further into this season of growth, may we trust that God is doing a new thing among us. Because of the crucified and risen Jesus, new life is not only a future promise, but also a present reality. Through his resurrection, you are made new and have the promise of life eternal. And through the Spirit working in our lives, that new life is revealed in us. Through the good work God has begun in you and in this community, we witness glimpses of God's Kingdom already here, and it will one day be brought to completion. With great joy and confidence, we declare that we can perceive the new life we have been given through Jesus Christ, now and forevermore.

## Celebrate the Halfway Point to Summer on May 1 May Day (May 1) celebrates the return of spring!

#### The Origins of May Day

Did you know that May Day has its roots in astronomy? Traditionally, it was the halfway point between the spring equinox and the summer solstice! In ancient times, this was one of the Celtic <u>cross-quarter days</u>, which marked the midway points between the (four) <u>solstices and equinoxes</u> of the year. As with many early holidays, May Day was rooted in agriculture. Springtime festivities filled with song and dance celebrated the sown fields starting to sprout. Cattle were driven to pasture, special bonfires were lit, and the doors of houses and livestock were decorated with yellow May flowers. In the Middle Ages, the Gaelic people celebrated the festival of Beltane, which means "Day of Fire." People created large bonfires and danced at night to celebrate.

May Day has a long history and tradition in England, some of which eventually came to America. Children would dance around the maypole, holding onto colorful ribbons. People would "bring in the May" by gathering wildflowers and green branches, weaving floral hoops and hair garlands, and crowning a May king and queen.

#### When Is May Day?

This one is easy to remember: May Day occurs annually on May 1

#### The Maypole Dance

Did you ever dance around the maypole as a child? Wrapping a maypole with colorful ribbons is a joyous tradition that still exists in some schools and communities.

Initially, the maypole was a living tree chosen from the woods with much merrymaking. Ancient Celts danced around the tree, praying for the fertility of their crops and all living things! For younger people, there was the possibility of courtship. If a young woman and man paired by sundown, their courtship continued so that the couple could get to know each other and, possibly, marry 6 weeks later on June's Midsummer's Day. This is how the "June wedding" became a tradition.

In the Middle Ages, all villages had maypoles. Towns would compete to see who had the tallest or best maypole. Over time, this Old English festival incorporated dance performances, plays, and literature. People would crown a "May Queen" for the day's festivities.

The strict Puritans of New England considered the celebrations of May Day to be licentious and pagan, so they forbade its observance, and the springtime holiday never became an important part of American culture as it was in many European countries.

Interestingly, from the late 19th century through the 1950s, the maypole dance and festivities became a rite of spring at some U.S. colleges. Seen as a wholesome tradition, this celebration often included class plays, Scottish dancing, Morris dancing, a cappella concerts, and cultural dancing and music displays.

In the 1960s and 1970s, interest waned; the May Queen and her court became more of a popularity contest. Today, the maypole dance is mainly celebrated in schools (from elementary through college) as a fun spring activity.

#### Making a May Basket

Ever heard of the May baskets? People would leave a paper basket or cone containing spring flowers and sweets on each other's doorsteps, usually anonymously.

This tradition was popular through the 19th and 20th centuries, especially with children or sweethearts. The custom was to knock on the door, yell "May basket!" and then run. If the recipient caught the giver, he or she was entitled to a kiss.

Louisa May Alcott wrote about May Basket Day in the late 1800s. In the 1920s, some bold schoolchildren hung a May basket for First Lady Grace Coolidge on the White House door.

The May Day basket is still a cherished tradition for some Americans, although it's not well known today. To make a simple May basket, fold a piece of colored paper into the shape of a cone. Then fill it with wildflowers! If you don't have colored paper, roll up and secure (with tape or a staple) a paper plate. Draw on the plate with spring colors and fill it with flowers!

You could also fill a real basket with little gifts such as flower seed packets, baked cookies, candies, and pretty trinkets. If you don't have a basket, an empty milk carton or seed pot would also do the trick. Just cover it in colored paper or pretty streamers and fill it with tissue paper!

#### 10 Ways to Celebrate May Day

Why not celebrate May Day? Here are some joyful May Day traditions marking the return of spring and the renewed gift of life.

Among the many superstitions associated with May Day was the belief that washing the face with dew on the morning of May 1 would beautify the skin and bring good luck. We say go ahead! Walk outside and sprinkle your face with morning dew (or snow!).

On May 1, people in Britain welcome spring by "Bringing in the May," or gathering cuttings of flowering trees for their homes. Bring in branches of <u>forsythia</u>, magnolia, redbud, <u>lilac</u>, or other flowering branches in your region! Make that May Day Basket of flowers! Get the kids involved. We like this little fellow's homemade basket, which he's probably leaving for Mom (shhh!).

in Hawaii May 1 is called "<u>Lei Day</u>," and people make pretty leis. Leis are garlands or wreaths that are often made with native Hawaiian flowers and leaves. These days, leis are given as a symbol of greeting, farewell, affection, celebration, or honor—all in the spirit of aloha. Make a lei or a garland for yourself or your mother!

Kids would go barefoot on May Day for the first time. Whatever your age today, walk barefoot in the morning dew (or snow?). Encourage the kids to do the same!

In parts of Ireland, people would make a May bush; typically, this was a thorn bush or branch decorated with flowers and ribbons. Create your own May bush or tree! Just decorate with colored ribbons!

Beekeepers traditionally moved bees on May 1.

Fishermen expect to catch fish on May Day. Find our Best Fishing Days here.

Traditionally, farmers planted <u>turnips</u> on this day. Other folklore has it that, to protect cucumbers from insects, they should be planted on May 1.

The Kentucky Derby starts off the month of May (the first Saturday of the month).



#### LIVING OUR BAPTISM...Five gifts of discipleship

When a baptized Christian affirms the faith (often called confirmation) the presiding minister addresses those making public affirmation of baptism and asks the question: Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

RESPONSE: We do, and ask God to help and guide us. (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 236)

And so begins a daily claiming and re-discovering of the God-given gifts of discipleship. These gifts overlap and are intertwined as one gift flows into another and into faithful living.

#### FIVE GIFTS OF DISCIPLESHIP ... during Easter

The season of Easter is an ideal time of the church year to emphasize LIVING OUR BAPTISM and discover the five gifts of discipleship. Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus. Jesus defeats death itself. He is risen indeed!

Easter propels us from the tomb and stench of death into a new life provided by Christ alone. Jesus lives again, but the story of his resurrection is not limited to his own single life. He lives, so others might live again. He lives, so we might be infused by the Holy Spirit to live as a new creation and in loving relationship with God.

The Apostle Paul in his letter to the Romans writes,

"Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in the newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." (Romans 6:4-5 NRSV)

Baptism and Easter have always had a strong connection. As Christianity spread in the early church, the weeks before Easter were used to instruct and prepare people for their upcoming baptism at the Easter Vigil—the night before Easter Sunday. The liturgy of Holy Baptism beautifully describes this new life in Christ Jesus:

"God, who is rich in mercy and love, gives us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of baptism. By water and the Word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to new life in Jesus Christ. We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world." (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, page 227)

Of all seasons of the year, the weeks of the Easter season end themselves to focus on "Living our Baptism." What does it mean to "join in God's mission for the life of the world"?



#### LIVING OUR BAPTISM

During the season of Easter, focus on "Living our Baptism." Integrate key sentences from the liturgy of Sacrament of Holy Baptism with the gifts of discipleship:

to live among God's faithful people,

to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,

to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed,

to serve all people, following the example of Jesus,

and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth? (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 236)

#### **EASTER: Living Our Baptism!**

Pour out your Holy Spirit, the power of your living Word, that those who are washed in the waters of baptism may be given new life. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 230)

#### SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER: Live among God's faithful people

We are born children of a fallen humanity; by water and the Holy Spirit we are reborn children of God and made members of the church, the body of Christ. Living with Christ and in the communion of saints, we grow in faith, love, and obedience to the will of God. (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 227)

#### THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER: Hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,

We welcome you into the body of Christ and into the mission we share: join us in giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God's creative and redeeming word to all the world. (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 231)

## FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: Proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed.

Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven. (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 231)

## FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: Serve all people, following the example of Jesus.

You belong to Christ, in whom you have been baptized. (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 230)

## SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: Strive for justice and peace in all the earth

We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world. (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 227)

#### **SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: Alleluia!**

Child of God, you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. Amen (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 231)



#### A seasonal gathering for Peer Spiritual Direction


